GREAT Online Store

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GREAT now has an online store! As a matter of fact, we've made a number of changes to streamline our processes and make life easier for our dedicated volunteers. Remember going to meet & greets and finding just the perfect color in a tee shirt, only to find out that the coordinator for Clearwater doesn't have your size? Or perhaps seeing your friend's dog in a new pattern of collar, but the only 2 left are in a different county? No more! Now, everything is centralized and in one place. You can go online, see what we have, place your order and pay via credit card, debit card or direct withdrawal from your bank account. The items will be shipped to you and you will have them in less than a week.

This change is good for GREAT in a variety of ways. Since we won't have inventory at the meet & greets, our coordinators will have much less work to do and can focus on educating the public about the dogs. We don't have to worry about that iffy gray area where we are competing for sales with the stores that are hosting us, which in some areas has been a sore spot. We don't have to order as much inventory, so more of our funds go directly to the dogs. And again, it's easier for the consumer to find what they want! Also, there is a clearance section where prices have been absolutely slashed... do be sure to check it out!

We're starting out with a "home-grown" store rather than a commercial site, so one thing we don't have access to is real-time inventory updates. Therefore, if we only have one Logo shirt in purple in size XL and someone orders it, the site won't update immediately (but will update that day). If by chance the item you order is sold out, your purchase price will be refunded. If you are uncertain as to the color of an item, please send an email (to the address on the "colors" page) and we'll get back to you with a clear description of the color so you can decide! We hope you will all enjoy the store and let family and friends know about it! (By the way, merchandise will still be available at our picnics and other special events – as long as we have permission from the venue to sell).

The change in the way we are handling merchandise leads us to another change that we are very excited about. We've found that while the adoption fee is \$150, the average amount spent by adopters is between \$167 and \$182 in order to purchase a muzzle and a martingale collar/leash set. Because merchandise is no longer be available at our meet & greets where adoptions take place, and some adoptions take place during "off" hours, we've raised our adoption fee to \$175 and INCLUDED a muzzle, solid collar/leash set and a GREAT ID tag. The items have been included in the foster dog packets and make it much easier to schedule adoptions and have everything that is needed right there! The GREAT tag is especially nifty, since combined with the owners' ID tag, it gives another opportunity for someone who finds a loose greyhound to contact someone right away and get that dog home!

We feel so strongly about this that we have also made GREAT tags available for sale on the web-site. We hope you'll enjoy the online store and the changes we have made! Make sure you check often... we'll have new merchandise available from time to time, starting with the Freedom Walker, a high quality hands-free leash that makes walking your dogs and keeping them safe and in control at meet & greets, etc. an absolute breeze! A Greyhound in Germany by Natalie Restivo

A few months after I adopted Fancy, I found out that I would be moving to Germany for the next 2 years to serve as a Staff Pediatrician at Spangdahlem Air Base. I was very excited to be moving to Europe, but had some concerns about my pets (I also have a cat, Jacques). Would they have to be in quarantine? Would I be able to find housing that allowed animals? How would I get them there? Fortunately, the Air Force has some wonderful websites that had answers to all of these questions. Most countries in Europe do not require quarantine for animals that have been appropriately vaccinated. Even England has capitulated, but it does require that animals arrive in the country through approved shipping routes. A health certificate is required and must be done within 30 days prior to arriving. The rabies vaccine, if not up to date, must be given no less than 30 days prior to leaving.

My next problem came when I went to the TMO office to book my military flight to Germany. I had to take a commercial airline to Baltimore where I would then meet my military charter flight. I was authorized to take both Fancy and Jacques on the military charter, but not on the commercial flight. Unfortunately, many airline carriers will not ship animals during the summer time due to the temperature. After calling several airlines, I found a solution. Continental Airlines actually has their own "Pet Desk" to coordinate the shipping of pets and other live animals. They were not able to arrange a flight the same day I left, but not only arranged a flight the day prior, but transported my pets to a kennel upon arrival in Baltimore and dropped them off in front of the AMC terminal at the airport the next day. It cost quite a bit of money, but I couldn't have been happier with the service I received.

When I arrived in Germany, I found out that I would not be staying in billeting like I thought I was. I had already arranged for Fancy and Jacques to stay in the base kennel because billeting doesn't accept pets. I ended up staying in a small, family-owned hotel in a very small village. When the proprietors found out that my pets were in the kennel, they insisted that I go and bring them to the hotel to stay with me. As I didn't have a car or a driver's license, the hotel owners drove me themselves to go and pick up Fancy and Jacques.

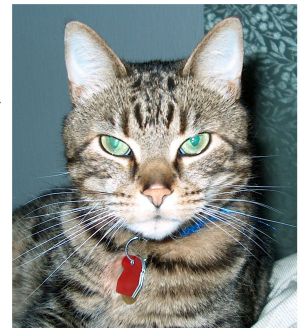

After a month of staying in the hotel, I was finally able to move into my apartment. It was a house with 4 units and a small backyard. That's where Fancy met a new friend. The tenant that lived above me was also in the military. She had a large Belgian Malinois-German Shepherd mix named Sinbad. Over the past 9 months, Fancy and Sinbad have become inseparable. Connie, Sinbad's mom, watches Fancy during the day and on her days off so that Fancy won't have to stay in the kennel all day. Fancy won't chew on rawhides at home, but she and Sinbad "fight" over them when they're together. Neither one of them can stand the other getting too much attention. When Connie comes home, Fancy knows it's her and starts whining and barking because she wants to go upstairs to see Sinbad. So you see, it looks like I've created a monster! But I shouldn't leave Jacques out either...he made friends with a stray cat that likes to come up to my glass door all the time. When Jacques sees him, he starts to whine and meow, no matter what time it is!

This past winter was interesting as Fancy has lived her entire life in Florida. She never really cared much for the cold, but snow was a totally new experience. The first time she walked on it, she started jumping up into the air every time she took a step. I wish I had a video camera at the time because it truly was the funniest thing I ever saw! Just before winter started, we had some nocturnal visitors in our backyard. Apparently, the backyard is a haven for hedgehogs. It gets dark pretty early here in the fall/winter, so when I took Fancy out, she started acting strangely and wouldn't go into the grass. I got a flashlight out and found a small hedgehog curled up into a little ball just by the patio.

So that has been our experience in Germany so far. The Germans love animals...they take their pets on holiday, to the store, and yes, even out to eat at restaurants! It still seems so foreign to me to do these things myself, but I love the fact that the Germans are so accepting of pets in just about any situation.

Coyote sightings & incidents have increased in Pinellas County. Adult coyotes weigh between 24 & 37 pounds & although attacks on domestic pets usually involve cats or other small pets, coyotes have been known to attack medium or large dogs on occasion. You can report coyote sightings in Pinellas County to Animal Services at (727) 582-2600. For more information, please go to www.pinellascounty.org/animalservices/coyote.pdf.

Some tips:

- ◆ Coyotes are most active between dusk & dawn, so please keep pets indoors, especially at night & when not supervised.
- ◆ Never feed any wild animal (with the exception of high-mounted bird feeders). Feeding wild animals attracts more of them & causes them to lose their natural fear of humans.
- ◆ Do not feed pets outside or store food outside.
- ◆ Use garbage cans with lids that latch & take garbage out on the morning of garbage pickup, especially if it contains food waste.
- ◆ Clear dense brush, wood piles & other hiding areas from your yard, & keep citrus or other fruit cleared from the ground, in order not to attract rodents (a favorite prey for coyotes).
- ◆ If you know that an area is frequented by coyotes, keep pets & children away.
- ◆ If you see a coyote, make sure they see you & fear you. Yell & clap, throw rocks or spray them with a garden hose.
- ◆ As always, make sure your pet's vaccines are up-to-date. Coyotes can carry rabies.

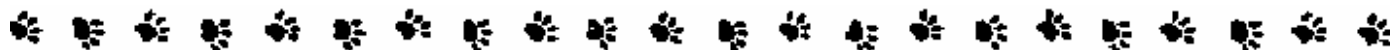

Fast Flea Facts *by Kobie Pierce*

1. Pet owners spend \$1 billion per year on controlling fleas.
2. The cat flea is the most common flea found in Florida. (It annoys dogs as well as cats!)
3. An adult flea can lay up to 50 eggs per day.
4. Flea eggs hatch in 1-12 days.
5. The flea life cycle progresses from eggs, to larvae, to pupae to adults.
6. The entire flea life cycle can take 2 weeks to 2 years (depending on conditions.)
7. If a pet is allergic to fleas, she may get a rash.
8. Fleas can transmit tapeworms to your pet. Symptoms of tapeworms include irritability, erratic appetite, shaggy coat, mild diarrhea that may be tinged with blood, weight loss and seizures.
9. Flea larvae feed on "flea dirt," the black, poppy seed-like excrement found on your pet.
10. Frequent removal of fleas (via flea combing or bathing) can decrease the flea infestation.

Healthy Reminders *by Granny Chilton*

- ◆ Fleas aren't the only nasty critters waiting to take a bite out of your pet (or you!) Ticks are active year-round in Florida, and this summer in particular has been a heavy season for ticks. Please remember to check your pets and your family daily for ticks and remove them immediately. Disease is much less likely if you remove ticks within 24 hours of being bitten, so don't let a day go by without checking, especially if you and your pets spend a lot of time outdoors. - ◆ A greyhound's nails need a trim if, when standing, you are unable to easily insert a piece of paper between the dog's nails and a smooth flooring surface (tile, wood, cement).
- ◆ Greyhounds are canine athletes. Even after retirement they are at their healthy best when the last 3 ribs are still visible to the eye. Being too heavy puts a strain on their joints and their internal organs.
- ◆ Help your greyhound look spiffy at meet-and-greets and when out on walks too! Keep his/her collar and leash clean by washing every month, or more frequently if needed. Remember to keep the identification tag and your county rabies tag on the collar at all times. For a great deal on a quality tag with deep engraving on both sides, perfect for listing multiple phone numbers or medical information, please go to www.boomerangtags.com
- ◆ Speaking of collars and tags, while it is important to make sure your pet ALWAYS has both items on, it's a good idea to microchip him as well. Periodically we will send out information about local low-cost microchip clinics provided by area rescue groups, but you can also ask your vet or local shelter for information on microchipping your pet. Don't forget to register the microchip with the national registry that your chip manufacturer provides - otherwise the microchip is useless!
- ◆ Accidents happen to all of us, including our pets, so a pet first aid kit is a good idea. For more information on what to stock in a first aid kit, check out the January 2003 issue of the GREATvine, available under the "Helpful Links" button on GREAT's home page. The first aid information is on pages 4 and 5. A well-stocked first aid kit can be used for humans and canines, and should be checked yearly to insure that products haven't expired or degraded. June 1st is a good time to check the kit, since that's when hurricane season begins! Also, be sure to re-stock your kit after use so that you don't run out of important items. Most importantly, consult with your veterinarian before using any product or medication on your pet.



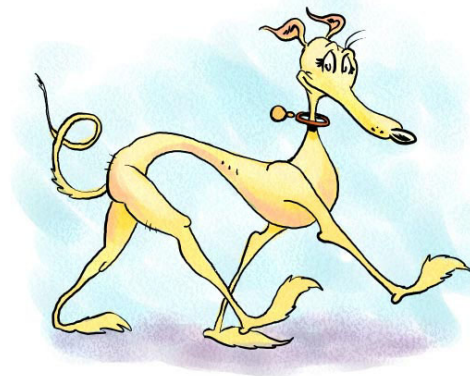
